Giving Thanks

Serving from the Sofa?



A s church attendance numbers fade across the nation and online services become very convenient it's important to remember why church attendance for you and your family matters so much. You can't serve

ers. We are contributors. We don't watch. We engage. We give. We sacrifice. We encourage. We pray by laying hands on the hurting. We do life together. The church needs you. And you need the church. The above message has been circulating regularly throughout social media since late 2020 and I've seen it on my Facebook news feed more than once. Can we as Christians serve from the sofa? Or does this message just touch the surface of possibly greater issues at large? There are many different ways to approach this message but I'll just touch on a few.

I, like many others, strongly value inperson community worship. However, as pointed out in my article from last month's newsletter, there are people who are unable to be part of such worship due to their own personal circumstances. These circumstances may be infrequent or temporary while others can be prolonged and even permanent. In terms of

people in the second group, what adjustments can we as a church body make to accommodate them so they are not marginalized or forgotten? For the record, I think this church has made an effort into being inclusive of such people; more so then several other churches. The question remains, can we possibly do more?

The above message states that "We [as Christians] don't watch. We engage." I fully agree with the ideals of that statement while realizing that in-person church attendance doesn't always translate to engagement. Pre-covid studies show that many churches have been operating on the 80/20 rule for several years. Basically, this means that 80 percent of the church's work comes from about 20 percent of the congregation. It can be all too easy to fall into "spectator" or "consumer" mode when attending a worship service - whether in person or through livestream. Opportunities to engage, sacrifice and encourage exist in nearly

every church, including ours, and a physical presence is not always required to partake in those opportunities. The problem often lies with the lack of volunteers more so than the opportunities. As our Lord said, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few."

A final point worth noting is that North American church attendance was steadily declining well before covid and the massive livestream movement it prompted. This issue deserves an article all on its own. Maybe one day, I'll take up the challenge to write one. I recognize that the content shared within social media can encourage as well as inform followers of Christ. Some of that content however can be over generalized and possibly lead us to try fixing something that's less broken than we think. I don't have any perfect answers to resolve the issues I've brought up but having us talk about them and sharing ideas would be a major step forward.


Yvonne's Butter Tarts

Mix 1/3 cup melted butter, 1 cup brown sugar, then add 2 tablespoons of milk. Beat an egg, add to mixture along with 1 teaspoon vanilla. Add ³/₄ cup raisins. Fills 15 tart shells. Bake on cookie sheet for 8 min at 450, then another 8 at 350 (or until set).
