Conclusion

- In his role as priest he speaks and acts on our behalf presenting us before God: alive, holy and perfect
- What kind of King is Jesus?
- "...the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords, ¹⁶ who alone has immortality, who dwells in unapproachable light..." (1Timothy 6.15-16)

What Kind of King? Leviticus 21 April 14th, 2019

Introduction

Jesus is our priest and king; he also fills the role of prophet thereby being the <u>exemplar</u> of all three offices of authority from the OT

This passage is about what God expects of the priests; the **standard** they are to meet and maintain

This passage is a study in <u>contrasts</u>: Life vs death; clean vs unclean, perfection over imperfection

Main Points: What can this king do?

- 1. Jesus can make us alive
 - The high priests couldn't approach dead bodies with the exception of close <u>family</u> members
 - Gerstenberger comments on the reasons the priests especially had to avoid contact with the dead:
 "Anything dead is laden with the power of death, and for that reason it does, in a special way, render a thing or person "impure," that is, incapable of dealing with the holy, the power of life itself."¹

- Death cannot and does not exist in the kingdom of God. God can enter into a fallen world but sin cannot enter into the **presence** of God
 - The Fall God comes to the Garden
 - The Incarnation God comes to the nation
 - At the Cross, Jesus conquers sin and gains victory over death
- We are covered in death; Jesus makes us alive

2. Jesus can make us clean

- Whether by death or marital status, or the behavior of children, it's <u>paramount</u> that the priest does not become unclean.
 - To be unclean is to be defiled, impure, polluted, corrupt
- So, who can come into the presence of God if in fact we have all <u>sinned</u> and fall short of the glory of God?
 - 1John 1.7-9; <u>Eph. 1:7; Heb. 9:14; 1</u>
 Pet. 1:18-22; <u>Rev. 7:14</u>
 - In contrast to the priests who became unclean if they came contact with something unclean, Jesus touched unclean people and made them clean
 - Matthew 8.1-4; Mark 1.40ff.
- We're all spiritual lepers, but we can call out to Jesus; he is willing to make us whole and more than that... to make us holy

3. Jesus can make us **perfect**

- The final prohibition in this chapter is against people who are physically <u>compromised</u> from serving as priest
 - Various bodily deformities, not all of which can be identified with certainty, preclude a priest from officiating in the sanctuary. The idea emerges clearly that holiness finds physical expression in wholeness and normality.²
 - Jesus makes us perfect; it is God who sanctifies
 - Leviticus 21.8, 15, 23; Hebrews 12.23; Jude 24
