# What Trumps Sin? Numbers 16

#### Introduction:

Sin. What is it?

The passage before us deals with overt, egregious sin and God's <u>reaction</u> to it

#### Points of interest:

- Korah's rebellion/sin arrogance; he wanted to usurp God's order
- The large number of people (250 prominent men) was designed to <u>intimidate</u>
- Sarcasm and irony
- The judgments of God: consumed by the earth, fire, and plague (and excommunication)
- Why does Moses fall on his face?

What does this passage teach us about God?

- 1. God is <u>faithful</u> to himself, his servant Moses, and his word
- 2. God is <u>holy</u>. Sin cannot exist in his presence. The Israelites are his people, and he will make them and keep them holy.
- 3. God is <u>iust</u>. Justice demands a response to rebellion. In order for God to be God he must respond to the sin in the camp. But...

God's justice incorporates...

#### **Mercy**

God told everyone else to step away lest they be consumed too

## **Holiness**

The purpose was to remind people what happened so that it wouldn't happen again; God was protecting His people

### <u>Atonement</u>

Aaron stood between the dead (14,700) and the living and the plague stopped

What have we learned today?

Sin and rebellion are <u>humanity's</u> effort to usurp God's authority and place

God is holy and just and <u>deals</u> with sin

God destroys sin and death so that sin and death won't destroy humanity

God's mercy and grace are ever present

God's glory is manifest in his <u>compassionate</u> sovereignty and <u>gracious</u> holiness

God's grace is greater than all our sin.
