The Trial: Part 1

John 18.19-24 March 21, 2021

Introduction

- John skips the trip to Herod
- John is there because he was known to the high priest

Main Points: the ignorance of unbelief

- 1. Annas questions Jesus about his disciples and his teaching
 - All of this was already known vs. 19-20
 - ...the questions of Annas about Jesus' disciples and his teaching are likely to be linked with the tradition perpetuated in the Talmud that Jesus was convicted of being a false prophet (note the citation from *Sanh*. 43a cited on p. 319). The mark of the false prophet is that he "secretly entices" or "leads astray" the people to apostatize from the God of Israel, the punishment for which is death (see Deut 13:1–10). It looks as if Annas was endeavoring to make Jesus incriminate himself on this issue. Jesus sees through this attempt and declares that his teaching of the people has been in public places, in the temple, and in synagogues, not in secret...¹
- 2. Jesus makes an appeal for witnesses
 - Who and what testifies on behalf of Jesus? vs. 21
 - o John the Baptist
 - His works: the signs/miracles/healings/exorcisms/resurrect ion

- The Father YHWH himself (at the baptism and transfiguration)
- \circ The Scriptures²
- No one can be put to death without multiple eye witness accounts
 - o Mark 14.55-59
 - o Deuteronomy 17.6
- 3. Is this how you treat THE High Priest
 - Everyone recognized this for what it was which incited the next action vs. 22
 - Jesus is the real High Priest
 - Hebrews 2.17; 4.14; 6.20; 7-9
 - Acts 23.2-3
 - Leviticus 19.15; Deuteronomy 25.1-2
- 4. Jesus is bound, and sent to Caiaphas
 - Annas had no answer to Jesus' challenge to the legality of the treatment meted out to him, and therefore Jesus emerged as the winner in this episode of challenge and riposte—he had not been shamed by Annas or his officials. Then Annas sent him, still bound, to Caiaphas the high priest. This appears to be a tacit recognition that they had no case against him.³ – vs. 24
 - Ironically, Jesus who came to set captives free (Luke 4.18) is bound
 - One day the grave could conceal Him no longer
 One day the stone rolled away from the door
 Then He arose, over death He had conquered
 Now He's ascended, my Lord evermore
 Death could not hold Him, the grave could not keep
