WHAT WE DON'T UNDERSTAND

n Saturday, February 18, a metal ball about 5 feet in diameter appeared on Enshuhama Beach in the coastal city of Hamamatsu, Japan. A passerby reported it to police which prompted an enthusiastic vet careful inspection. Apparently, a local man told a media outlet that the ball had sat there for more than a month but that didn't matter. The beach was cordoned off, with officials in protective clothing sent to inspect the object.

Masaki Matsukawa, a representative of the city's civilengineering office, told reporters that the rust-pocked object had still not been identified. The office said it could be a buoy, — an explanation supported by the presence of two apparent metal handles sticking out of it. But on the tail of the media attention around Chinese spy balloons, the ob-

READING AT HILLVIEW SCHOOL

Some Hillview people have asked me, "What exactly is the Hillview School Reading Program and how did it get started?" The answer, like the activity itself, is so easy to explain - it means taking a little bit of time to listen to children read. That is all helping children that are having difficulties with their reading and comprehension. Basically, what most of us did with our own children.

The idea of the Reading program began during some preparations for the White Christmas ministry in 2019. Yvonne Aben and myself arranged to meet with the school principal. During our conversation with the principal, she mentioned that they were always looking for vol-

unteers wishing to read to children that were experiencing difficulties in reading and comprehension. Some of the difficulties could be attributed to cultural differences and understanding the English language.


church board we organized a group of volunteers and our Reading Program was well under-way. Volunteers were assigned to students and it did not take long to build relationships. We were working with their teachers in helping them to develop basic foundational reading concepts, phonics, and vocabulary skills. From week to week it was a gratifying experience as the children began to gain confidence and begin to develop a love for reading. Many of

the students became enthusiastic readers and indeed self-motivated to become good readers. Little did we know that this ministry would expand to include tutoring some students in math. Let me assure you, there is no such thing as simple mathematics. Many of us were challenged to leave our comfort zone and embrace what is now called the "New Math". To some of us this was an exceedingly steep learning curve, but we adapted and added a new ability to our skill set. I must admit I enjoy the opportunity to assist and found math tutoring my gift.

Then came 2020, a New Year, but trouble on the horizon - by March 2020 Covid 19 had altered our way of life. Many schools were closed and our Reading Ministry was suspended until the schools re-opened. After almost two years we were able to reconnect with the Hillview School and continue our reading ministry. Teachers are continually confronted with students not reading at grade level and have asked for supplemental reading support to assist the children struggling with reading and comprehension.

We all recognized that students have different learning curves, therefore commitment and acknowledging success, no matter how small, builds a student's confidence. Building bonds and developing expectations is rewarding. Teachers have shown their appreciation by giving us positive feedback, to many we have made a difference. Children actually look forward to seeing us. Apparently, they sit patiently in the school library. Many thanks to the volunteers.

ject has sent social-media users into a flurry of speculation.

Whenever we encounter something new, something we don't recognize, something we do not understand, we tend to rationalize and explain the phenomenon. The season of Lent began last week reminding us and preparing us for reflection and celebration of the Passion and Resurrection of Christ. The Resurrection of Jesus was, and still is the most significant event in human history. Many people at the time were confused and disturbed with the reality of the empty tomb. Almost instantly theories arose trying to explain the mystery of what happened to the body of Jesus the Nazarene. Some people said that the disciples

came in the night and took the body away. Other people have suggested that Jesus never really died but woke up, rolled the stone away and walked off. Some say the wrong tomb was visited Easter Sunday. And then there is the idea that the people who claimed to have seen, spoken, and felt Jesus post-crucifixion were simply hallucinating.

Unlike the recently discovered metallic orb, the truth of what happened to Jesus is not a mystery. The resurrection of Jesus is foreshadowed and forespoken in Scripture: let him, or her, who has ears to hear. let them hear what God has said and perceive what God has done. God is true to His word and perfect in His love and faithfulness. Sometimes we don't know what to make of a situation, but we have this instruction from Scripture...

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God. Consider him who endured from sinners such hostility against himself, so that you may not grow weary or fainthearted. Hebrews 12.1-3

Jesus is alive; He is risen! He is Lord. Nothing is unknown to God. Let us resist the urge to speculate and theorize, but instead cling to what we know about God and trust God for wisdom, direction, and understanding when we don't know what to do or make of what lies before. "... the truth of what happened to Jesus is not a mystery."



n Page 6 of the February issue of Reflections there were two mind-bending puzzles submitted by my son-in-law, Matthew, for your enjoyment. I have not heard if Gabriele was bamboozled or not, nevertheless as promised the solutions are as follows: ed

Problem 1. Either A or C is driving the vehicle in the robbery. If the person driving is A, then A was involved in the robbery. Otherwise, the person driving is C, and so A is also involved in the robbery by (b). In either case, A is guilty.

Problem 2.

(a) Let's consider the possibility that Alice is a Knight. Then Bob would also be a Knight since Alice's assertion is true. But then Bob's claim implies that Alice is a Knave. Since Alice cannot be both a Knight and Knave, we deduce that Alice is not a Knight. Therefore Alice is a Knave. Since we now know that Bob's assertion is true, we deduce that Bob is a Knight.

(b) Let's consider the possibility that Diane is a Knave. Then all three in the group are Knaves since Diane's assertion is false, and so Charlie's claim is true. But then Charlie must be a Knight. Since Charlie cannot be both a Knight and a Knave, we deduce that Diane cannot be a Knave and, therefore, Diane is a Knight. Since Diane is a Knight, Ed's claim is false. So Ed is a Knave. From this we see that Charlie's claim is true, implying that Charlie is a Knight.

(c) Whether Frances were a Knight or a Knave, they would not claim to be a Knave. So George is lying, and thus George is a Knave. Since George (necessarily falsely) asserts that Frances is a Knave, we deduce that Frances is a Knight.

FUN AT THE FOOD BANK

e are discovering that being a Food Bank Distribution Centrehere at Hillview has an unexpected benefit - it is becoming a place of appreciating the visitors and having some special interactions with them, and them with us. Let me share a couple of these special moments with you.

When the clients arrive for their food hampers and, because the boxes are recycled/reused by the food bank, the hamper contents need to be repacked by the clients into their own containers. As they go through this process, if there is any food item(s) they don't use, they can place it on a designated bench in the sorting area. Above the bench a sign says "Help yourself to what you can use". This one particular day my job was greeter/door person. A big tall man came in with his wife to pick up their hamper. I had been outside, on a chilly day, and came in to warm up. There was some free space on the "help yourself bench", so I sat down there to stay out of the way. As the man and his wife left, he came up to me, took me by the hand and said, "You're coming with me". The entire place erupted in laughter as Jo rushed to rescue me.

In addition to me, there is literature on the bench that may help the clients, along with some church information, and Bibles. I am happy to report that all the Bibles have been tak-

en by the clients. Margaret Dolezal has a special and perceptive ability of introducing people to the material and the Bibles. When I mentioned to Al Aben that all the Bibles have been picked up he assured me that we can obtain additional copies from the Gideons' and in languages that may be more accessible to the people in our community. 

any times, when people find out that Herman and I were married for 68 years, they ask me, "What is your secret?" We had no secrets but being born again believers was the foundation towards our long and happy marriage. Some of our bonding took place while we were dating. We always ended our dates by praying together, seeking God's will and direction for us as a couple.

After our marriage in 1953, one of the first things we established was having devotions together after breakfast, or later, when the children had to hurry to get to school, after supper. We used "Our Daily Bread" or other devotionals and always prayed for the missionary whose prayer card was in the front of our plastic prayer card holder, then put the card in the back and the next morning prayed for the next one. We asked North America Baptist Conference(NAB) to send us a packet of prayer cards and also asked the missionaries to send us their regular prayer letters so we could pray for their particular needs and ministries.

Another decision we made was to faithfully give our tithe each month to the church and/or other charitable ministries. At first, this was difficult since I was the bread-winner in the family while Herman attended college and seminary. In those days, women were very poorly paid, but we persisted and always had our needs supplied, sometimes in surprising ways! When our son, Allan, was born in 1958, I quit my job. Our only income was from whatever ministry assignments Herman could pick up in between studies. While I was still in the hospital, men from First Baptist Church, Chancellor, South Dakota (SD) came to interview Herman to become their pastor while continuing his studies at the seminary in Sioux Falls, SD for another year and a half. We moved to the parsonage in Chancellor. The commute was 25 miles, but there was no rent to pay and a steady income!! Wow! God supplied just when we really needed Him to.

As pastor and wife, we did everything together - visiting, counselling, teaching, singing, evangelistic meetings, taking programs to senior meetings or homes or church services. As missionaries on home-assignment we shared our ministry with many NAB churches. We also prepared the programs for our travels with the Brazil Praise Singers all across North America. We visited all of our mission fields when Herman was Director of NAB Missions. (me on personal expense).

Herman officially retired in 1998, but he was only pretending. During our retirement years, we led 22 work teams to Brazil and



Recipe Central - Coconut balls

- ½ teaspoon vanilla
- ¼ teaspoon sea salt (I roll the balls lightly in the sea salt instead of mixing it in)
 - 1. Mix everything together.
 - 2. Roll into tablespoon sized balls.
 - 3. Place in freezer 1/2 hour
