Something to Celebrate

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hristmas! Literally, the celebration of Christ. And what are we celebrating? We are celebrating the incarnation of God. John 1.14 puts it like this: "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth."

This is not the first time God dwelt with his people. In Exodus. God tells Moses that a tent is to be built and God also tells him how to build it. The directions are specific because this is where God plans to reside from time to time. We know this tent as the Tabernacle, which is the same word John uses when he says "God dwelt among us."

God "tabernacled" with His people in the desert, until the construction of the Temple which was completed under Solomon. Later God moved because the Temple got destroyed



by the Babylonians. It was rebuilt under the Persians, and finally destroyed again under the Romans in 70AD.

So where does God live now? Many people would say, "Heaven" while others might say everywhere. Neither answer is wrong, but there is one more possibility. In his first letter to the Corinthians, Paul asks, "Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you?" Paul repeats the sentiment in chapter 6. In Ephesians, Paul says the Church is the Temple. The point is this: you are the Temple, the place where God lives.

What we celebrate on December 25 is a truth, a reality, that extends beyond a manger, beyond a cross, beyond an empty tomb. We celebrate the incarnation. we celebrate Immanuel - God with us - because He truly is with us. More than that, He is in us, transforming us, saving us until that great and glorious day when Jesus returns. "For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I have been fully known." 1Corinthians 13.12. That is indeed, something to celebrate.

- It was December 1993 and I had just been informed that my job as Executive Assistant (EA) to The Chief Electoral Officer (CEO) would be coming to an end. The present CEO was retiring and the replacement was bringing his own EA. I would eventually receive a pay out and be considered for other jobs, if and when they became available. At that time I was a single mom, and had to figure out how to survive Christmas and make it the best possible Christmas for my son David. David was 16 years old and this would be our first Christmas since his dad. my husband, died.

On December 23, I was almost ready for Christmas. I say almost because the tree was still missing. When we lived in High Level, getting the Christmas tree was a family event. We would go on ski-doos, with a sleigh, and select the best tree, have a wiener roast and bring the tree home. But this year was going to be different. We were living in Edmonton and David's dad was not with us to participate in the traditional Swain Family Christmas Tree Search. This year I would have to buy a tree and, for David's sake, it had to be a real tree.

As I left the grocery store I came across a tree lot. I

pulled in and asked the man what tree could I get for \$23? That was all the money I had left until I received my pay out cheque. The man looked at me like I was from outer space and told me he had no trees for under \$50. Further down the road there was another tree lot.



Same story. I kept driving and then, close to my home, there was another small lot in a corner. I pulled in and told the man my story and he had no pity either. I did see a small broken tree leaning up against a building and asked the lot owner if I could purchase that one. He said it wasn't for sale. I reminded him that it was only two more days until Christmas and he had a lot full of trees. What was he going to do with all those leftover trees? He told me that I would be surprised at the number of people who

came tree shopping on Christmas Eve.

I left that last lot very dejected, broken in spirit and so alone. I started to cry so hard I had to pull over to get myself together for the drive home. As I sat there I had a real talk with God. "How can you let this

happen to us"? Do you forget that I taught Sunday school for all those years, I went to Russia for nine months and worked with kids?" I listed all my good deeds until I was drained. Now I had to go home and tell David we would not be having Christmas tree.

Usually when I brought groceries home I would park in the front street. But in my confusion I ended up driving down our back alley. Just as I got two doors from our home there, sitting in the middle of the alley, was a beautiful, real Christmas tree. I could not believe my eyes. I was so excited I almost ran the tree down. Jumping out of the car and running to the tree I noticed it had a tag on it that read, "FREE TREE". Wanting to know where it came from I followed the footprints in the snow to the neighbours home, two doors away. By the time I got to the back door and knocked on the door, I

wasn't crying, I was bawling. The man came to the door and thought some-thing had happened to me because of my blubbering. Finally, I calmed down enough to hear the tree story. He and his son had been out to their farm a few days ago to get their tree. As they were leaving the farm, a little voice told the man to get another tree. He didn't know why or who it was for, but he listened to the voice and brought home two trees. He said he forgot about the tree until about ten minutes ago and decided to go and put it out in the alley. You guessed it, I'm bawling again.

I couldn't thank that man enough for listening to that little voice. Running back to the alley, I grabbed the tree and ran home, opening the back door and yelling to David, "Look at the tree that God gave us". It truly was a memorable Christmas!

To this day I have the tag off that tree. Every year, even though David is no longer with me, I hang that tag on the tree to remind me of how much God cares about every detail of our lives. "For unto you is born this day in the City of David, a Savior which is Christ the Lord". Amen.

David was killed at the age of 40 in a motor-cycle accident. He was just 6 miles from home. In spite of many trials, Gloria is a faithful stalwart at Hillview. She is on the mission committee, a deacon and a prayer warrior. She laughs easily and apparently is willing to assist with almost any aspirational project the church dreams up. Ed.

We do it for the children! Donalda Nelson


Dear Editor, I wanted to take a moment to give the biggest form of gratitude and thanks that I could possibly give to this wonderful congregation.



Nativity Misconceptions

Three years ago, in a burst of possibly misplaced enthusiasm, some Hillview men thought the church should celebrate Jesus birth by displaying a nativity scene. I was part of that group and we were all expecting a traditional image of the manger, Jesus, Mary and Joseph. The artist had a totally different idea. The "painting" we received was a shock, a surprise, but after some deliberations, we realized this was an opportunity to reassess and contemplate what we actually understood about Jesus' birth.

According to the artist, he undertook some intensive research and, based on that research, created the above nativity scene. The image was, and is, a challenge to some of our traditional thoughts and Biblical understanding regarding that birth some 2000 years ago. Obviously, the artwork has some controversial aspects. I thought it might be interesting to reexamine the artwork and identify some of the many misconceptions surrounding the most important historical event in the annals of the world. Please note, I am not even remotely a Biblical scholar. I received most of the following insights from my nephew, Jonathan Anderson, the pastor of Redemption Church in Olds, Alberta. Ed.

Let's start with the angels located above the "stable". There is nowhere in the Bible indicating that angels have wings. In the Old Testament angels seem to appear as men. A common reaction to angels is fear and trembling. If you look through scripture carefully, you will notice that angels never "sing"! They are only ever recorded as speaking. The angels around the throne "say" holy, holy, holy - not sing it. The angels appearing to the shepherds are never said to be singing, only speaking. Perhaps only humans have been given the ability to sing as a specific gift meant to be used to worship God. I wonder if that means that Keith may have to change the name of the women singing with him on stage? He calls them the "angels".

The "stable" was most likely not a barn or a cave. The houses in that time usually had a stable attached to the home of the family. Sorta similar to a mother-in-law suite!

In the painting Joseph is depicted as quite old. It is very likely that Joseph was older than Mary, but how much older is a point of speculation. It often took a man into his mid-20's to mid-30's to pay a dowry and support a wife and family. Mary could well have been 13-15. Of course scripture is silent on these things, but those would be cultural norms. It is interesting that Joseph never appears again after Jesus' visit to the temple at the age of 12. This gives rise to justified suspicions that Joseph probably died early in Jesus' young adulthood and also supports the notion that he was much older than Mary.

The halos (often called a nimbus) were a part of early Catholic art and the Orthodox Church. In general, they are not part of evangelical doctrine. They signify deity or holiness, and relates with the Catholic/Orthodox idea of saints. Saints are considered people who lived with such holiness that they actually earned a place of 'merit' before the Lord and are in that position even after death. They can dispense grace towards us 'normal' folks. This explains why Catholics pray to Mary. In Luke 1:28 the angel says that Mary is "highly favoured" and that is why she is considered some kind of special super saint. Actually, Mary was simply a faithful young lady who clearly trusted the Lord and was humble before Him; putting a halo on her (and/or Joseph) is a distraction from the Biblical story.

The letters in the Halo are also Orthodox tradition. O W N (οων = Omicron, Omega, Nu) are usually written in all capitals. The root of it, however, comes from an orthodox interpretation of Exodus 3:14. It literally means "the existing one" in Greek. The one who is. The Hebrew of Exodus 3:14 is perfectly repetitive, the Lord says "YHWH ESHR YHWH" - I Am who I Am. So it is, in a way, identifying Jesus as YHWH. This is beyond my comprehension. We probably need Wayne Baker to explain.

We assume there were three wisemen because there were three gifts. However, there were probably



more than three, and they were most likely travelling with a large entourage. Matthew 2:1 tells us the wisemen arrived after Jesus was born but still during the reign of Herod. Apparently the wisemen were relaxing at home when the miraculous star appeared and motivated their trip. If the star appeared on the day of Jesus' birth, they would need time to prepare. Their journey from 'the east,' probably would take at least 3-6 months. They returned home without reporting to Herod and, as a result, Herod kills all the male babies in Bethlehem under the age of 2. (Matthew 2:16). Herod never explained his rationale for the two year timeframe. Perhaps the wisemen told Herod that the Jesus star arose two years ago. An-

other possibility is that Herod simply decided to kill older babies to ensure all his bases were covered. There is lots of speculation, but scripture is mostly silent. The significant aspect is that even the rich, educated and powerful came to worship Jesus.

There are also some interesting theories as to where the wisemen originated from. Daniel was in Babylon and started an order of wisemen (Daniel 5:11). It is possible that the wisemen knew of Daniel's prophesies and were probably awaiting the coming Messiah. As far as their ethnicity, Isaiah 49:6 speaks of the Messiah coming as a light to the nations; Revelation 5 talks about people around the throne from every language, nation, tribe and tongue. Theologically, this is an interesting point, but the wisemen were likely of middle eastern descent. However, the artwork reminds us Jesus came to save everyone and the artist, by including different ethnicities, is attempting to illustrate that fact.

Jesus's Birth was Predicted

The Old Testament has many prophecies concerning the birth of Jesus.

Lineage Prophecies:

Isaiah 7: 14-16 The virgin will conceive, have a son, and name him Immanuel. Obviously there is only one historical person that I am aware of who meets this criteria.

Ancestral Prophecies:

Genesis 3:15 says the messiah will be from the "seed of Eve". Obviously, everyone is her descendant.

Genesis 9:27 says the seed (i.e. Jesus) will be from one of Noah's sons. Eve is the mother of all humanity and Noah's three sons are the father of all humanity following the flood. Genesis 12:23; 28:14. Jesus has Abraham in the Messiah's lineage. Genesis 17:19; 21:12, Psalms 89:3-4,19,27-29:35-37. The Messiah will be of the tribe of ludah and Son of David These prophecies restrict who could be the Messiah.

Another group of the prophecies predicts that Christ would be born in Bethlehem (Micah 4:1-8), fulfilled in (Luke 1:33), and be a blessing to the nations. These are fulfilled in Galatians 3:8,16; Hebrews 6:14.

The Star:

We are told the Star of Bethlehem appeared and led the wisemen (Psalm 72:10) to Jerusalem and from there to Bethlehem. Apparently, the star appeared two years before Jesus' birth because Herod (Jeremiah 31:15) ordered children two years and younger to be killed. Assuming they took a few days to determine the meaning of the star, then time to prepare for the journey, it still gives the group plenty of time to arrive in Bethlehem. It would be less than three months to travel from Babylon, Assyria, or the Medo - Persian empires to Jerusalem. This prophecy is part of the reasons behind the tradition that the wisemen came from Babylon or Medo Persia. Daniel was influential in both kingdoms and his prophecies would have been kept. It is thought that the wisemen consulted the writings of Daniel (Daniel 9 24-27). However, one could travel from India and possibly even China within the 2 year period. If this is so, then the blessing to the nations may be even seen in the birth narrative. as God announced Christ's birth where even foreigners could "read" the news of Christ's birth.

Final Thoughts:

Some skeptics suggest that Jesus read the Scriptures and decided to fulfill the prophecies, and even arranged for his followers to help him in completing those prophecies. However, the reality is the number of birth prophecies are so numerous that no one but Jesus could have fulfilled all of them. Furthermore, some of the prophesies contain elements that would not be easily accepted by Jews. For example, the blessing through Abraham would include all nations, such as Samaria, and even Rome. The Jews hated the rule of Rome.

There are over 300 prophecies concerning Jesus in the Old Testament. The mathematical probability of Jesus fulfilling them without being part of God's plan is astronomical. For you numbers people, Peter Stoner, Chairman of the Department of Mathematics at Pasadena College, calculated that for lesus to fulfil even 8 Old Testament prophecies is 1 in 10 to the 17th power. Jesus fulfilled all of the prophecies outlined in the Old Testament. He is without a doubt God's son and our personal Saviour and indeed Saviour of all peoples of the world, if we accept him as Lord. Ed.

Happy 90th Birthday Dad! Love Ya Bro! Dan




